

Join us to explore the significance of Easter.

Dear Friends

I wonder if you have ever waited anxiously for something to arrive. Maybe it's a gift you have ordered for someone for a special occasion? Maybe it's a significant day in your calendar like a holiday or a birthday or a concert for which you have tickets? Maybe it's a wedding or the birth of a child and there's a sense that when this day arrives things will never be the same again. As Christians journey through the season of Lent it can seem like a long season. Although the days are getting brighter, the weather is often cold and wet. You perhaps miss those little creature comforts you may have given up for Lent. You long for the day you believe to be significant, the dawn of Easter and all that the day means and symbolises in human experience. As we look forward to that day, I wonder what it means for you or to you? Is it about an opportunity to get together with family and friends? Is it about hope breaking through after a season in the wilderness? Is it about light breaking through the darkness or about Jesus rising from the dead? What difference does this make to our ordinary everyday lives in 2024? What impact

might it have on our children or grandchildren? If you've never thought much about it before or attempted to explain it to someone else, it can be a bit tricky to unpack. When I talk to other parents at the school gate or people I meet at my children's sporting activities or chat with neighbours who know what I do, they are conscious in many cases that Easter is a busy time in the life of a church. When I try to describe it, I usually talk about it as an experience. If you have always lived your life without any reference to God or Jesus it doesn't necessarily make a great deal of sense to you. It's only when you come along and try to understand it and why it might be significant, that things start to happen that might be hard to explain. I read in a textbook that we used to use to prepare young people for confirmation about a journalist who sought to highlight the irrelevance of Jesus' teaching to modern life. To research his article he determined to read the New Testament in the Bible and to try to put into practice any of the teachings of Jesus he could find to show how out of touch they were in relation to modern life.

As his experiment continued, he found to his surprise that the barriers in his mind about Christianity began to evaporate. In fact, within 4 weeks he found himself starting to attend a church and, within a few weeks of that beginning, he decided to commit his own life to following Jesus. In the life of our church, Easter is quite an immersive experience. We can't force anyone to come on the journey but if people engage with the events of the last week of Jesus' life (what we usually call Holy Week) they rarely remain unmoved and often they are changed.

Each evening during Holy Week (25th - 29th March), there will be special services and liturgies at 7.30pm. These will not only reflect on some of the key moments in that week for Jesus of Nazareth and their significance, they will also offer an opportunity to think about our own lives. We will be welcoming guests to come and share something of their journey from the Monday to the Thursday evening. They might describe the difference it has made to have a sense of God's presence or

what their life looks like as a result of that decision to follow Jesus.

I'm excited about the people who are coming, not because they are particularly special or eloquent though I think they all are. I'm excited that they are all different and have a unique story to tell and as we hear those stories it often triggers something in us. Wouldn't it be amazing if those stories awakened something powerful and profound in our own lives? One of the significant things we can do as Holy Week and Easter approach, is invite someone to come along. I'm thrilled the way our confirmation class has grown in size in recent weeks. Friends are inviting friends and coming together, some from other churches or communities but it's great to have the chance to explore the claims of the Christian faith together. On Good Friday we have a special short service for children and young people at 12 noon and on Good Friday evening, we have the reflective service of Tenebrae where we hear a reading of the trial and crucifixion of Jesus from the Gospel of John at 7.30pm.

Good Friday is a day of prayer in our church and we ask people to take responsibility for maintaining a presence of prayer throughout the day from 7am-7pm. There will be some guiding points for prayer if people wish to utilise them. On Easter Day there will be celebrations of Holy Communion at 9am, 11am and 7pm.

It would be very special to invite people along to some of these services. If you have family members or friends who are curious about spiritual things, church during Holy Week and Easter is reflective, thought-provoking and brings up all sorts of things for us. We hope many of these services will be live-streamed but nothing quite beats the experience of being there in person if we can. I know many people who don't consider themselves to be churchgoers but who make a point of popping in for a while on Good Friday to have some quiet and thinking time.

Please spread the word and let people know they are welcome. With very best wishes.



Hello everyone

Reminder: No Branch Meeting on Thursday 4th April as it falls in the Easter Week holiday period.

What comes to mind when the month of April arrives? Easter, flowers and April showers perhaps. Apparently, our word April may come from the Latin word 'aperire' meaning to open as in the flowers and trees blossoming with life, energy and vitality. Some birthday anniversaries are marked by special days of celebration such as 23rd April for William Shakespeare and 13th April for Alfred Mosher Butts (inventor of the Scrabble word game) On the 2nd April each year it is World Autism Day to recognise the gifts of people living with this condition and highlighting ways in which awareness of issues facing them can be raised and overcome. I've been looking at a resource on the parables of Jesus for people with learning disabilities called 'Secrets of the Kingdom', the first being "Heaven is a real place, and it is amazing!" Just a short sentence but so arresting! The prop for the lesson was a big old-fashioned key like the one I recently borrowed to access the church on behalf of the church flowers' team. As we prepare to celebrate Easter, this reminded me that the key into heaven is through Jesus alone because of His victory over sin, death and hell by his life, death and resurrection. We will be happy there because of Him.

Hello Ladies,



St. Finnian's Pilates



Here we go again, spring is in the air and hopefully everyone is feeling that bit better with more sunlight and just a little more heat. In the meantime Pilates at St. Finnian's continues to be well supported and I trust that one of the reasons for this is that people are appreciating the impact that the exercises are having on their general well-being and in particular on the health of their spines. I mention this because a key focus of Pilates is to help maintain the natural curvature and to fully utilise the potential range of movement in each segment of the spine in a symmetrical manner and to do this through a series of specific exercises designed to improve its alignment and flexibility. I have often heard it said that you're as old as your spine and, when you think about it, this makes perfect sense. If you have strength or flexibility, imbalances in your spine or bad postural habits and injuries, the range of movement without pain or discomfort will be restricted and you will often look or feel older than your years. The opposite is also true in that a person with good posture and a strong, well-aligned and flexible spine, will appear younger than they actually are. Our spines are wonderful things and, rather than being a straight rod, they consist of 33 bones in 5 specific sections with each section having a distinct curve which enhances its ability to move and act as shock absorbers. However, the 12 vertebrae in the thoracic section (the upper back) and the 5 larger lumbar vertebrae (lower back) are key for the major movements of the spine from below the neck to hip level and are the focal point of many of the exercises we do in the class. Some exercises will help develop the muscles that control the back in flexion (bending forward or sideways) while others will do the same in extension (moving backward beyond the normal 'straight' position) and rotation to the left and right. In every case it is just as important to provide a series of movements that stretch and bring the muscles back to their relaxed position and help release any residual tension. Hopefully this wee article will provide a bit of fuel for thought and maybe increase your understanding of why, in the case of those who faithfully come along week after week, you're being asked to do all these odd movements. Time to sign off now with my usual exhortation to stay safe and keep moving.

We meet on Wednesdays at 7pm in the Huston Hall. Everyone is very welcome and a small donation of £3 per class is requested to go towards church funds.
