# Dear Friends

It's hard to believe that Christmas is just around the corner. We shouldn't be all that surprised really, since the Christmas movies have been beaming in on one of our channels since late August I think. The shops have had all their Christmas goods on display since Halloween and charities and churches have sent out their Christmas appeal letters looking for support in order to keep their organisations and activities running.

The Archbishops of Dublin and Armagh have designated Advent Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> December as a special day of prayer for peace in the Middle East and have launched an appeal through the Bishops' Appeal to have special collections at all of our churches to support those whose lives have been thrown into such chaos and upheaval and unbelievable suffering as a result of the wars raging in that region. Christmas always strikes me as a very emotional and personal time. If life is good and you are happy and healthy you look forward to gathering with family and friends, sharing a special meal together and singing carols and perhaps coming to worship together if you are a household

of faith.

It's a very different experience if you have lost someone you love and you feel that loss acutely in the midst of all the celebrations around you. You perhaps want to avert your eyes from all the jollity and parties and celebrations going on around you and retreat into yourself. You long for when the festival will be over and life returns to something resembling routine and normality again.

Children look forward to presents and school plays and concerts with proud parents beaming on at their performances. The other side of course is that many children don't have enough. They are trapped in situations of poverty and neglect and domestic violence and these are never comfortable realities to consider. Over the coming weeks we hope each household will receive an invitation to Christmas services and events in St. Finnian's. We recognise the complexity and challenge of the season for many but we also see it as an important opportunity to talk and share about a word that lies at the heart of the Christian understanding of this time of year and that word is hope.

God's son Jesus Christ was born into a world that faced many challenges all those years ago. There was imperial oppression, there were malevolent forces at work that sought to kill babies and young children. There was a lot of poverty and economic struggle. Wars raged and a little baby was born in very stripped back and challenging circumstances. This baby was foretold centuries before by prophets and hailed as the promised or anointed one, the Messiah who would make things new, who would offer hope, shine light into people's darkness and walk alongside them no matter what they faced. This is the one we herald and celebrate today and in this season. We long for people to encounter Him which is why we hold special services and events. We want to put the Christ child at the front and centre of all our celebrations. There are traditional opportunities to do that in carol services and the First Communion of Christmas and family celebrations of Christmas. These are events to invite neighbours and friends to alongside outreach events like our movie night on Friday 6<sup>th</sup> December where we want the

community to enjoy a Christmas movie with us, sing some carols and take away some thoughts and gifts that remind us of the true meaning of Christmas. Wherever and however you celebrate Christmas this year, whether it's welcoming home family from faraway places or you have a quieter more reflective time on your own, we want to take this opportunity to wish you a happy and peaceful season. The church's liturgical calendar offers us the season of Advent as a way to build up towards it and make some spiritual preparations. The short 30 minute services on Thursdays in Advent are a good vehicle for this, offering an opportunity to draw aside from all the busyness and activity to be still and worship. It's a season too in which we are preparing to say farewell to our curate Reverend Andy Hay as he prepares to take up his new appointment as priest-in-charge of Clonallon and Warrenpoint with Rostrevor on 6<sup>th</sup> January. There will be a presentation to Andy after our Service of 9 Lessons and Carols on 22<sup>nd</sup> December and he will be sharing in our Christmas services.

Over the past three and a half years he has made an enormous contribution to the parish with his thoughtful Bible teaching, pastoral care and imaginative outreach ideas. We wish Andy and his family every blessing as they move on to their next season of ministry and assure them of our prayers.

If anyone would like to have Holy Communion in their home or are unable to get out to any of our special services, do please let one of the clergy know and we would be glad to come.

As we look forward to these weeks, please be mindful of all those for whom it is a painful and difficult season. Checking in on those who have been through difficult times, praying for them, phone calls and cards are all greatly appreciated as we seek as a community to support one another and make the presence of Jesus real and known in our community.

Hi everyone,

This month I'd like to focus on the role of Pilates within 'Sport' in general. It seems surprising that, alongside the rapid growth in the number of fitness and sports centres, there has been an equivalent growth in the number of sports injury clinics and the question is why this should be so if sport is supposed to increase fitness and health. The answer is relatively straightforward in the case of the enthusiastic amateur sportsperson as they are usually playing a game for which they are not fit. A classic example is the middle-aged born again footballers or tennis players taking up the game after many years of absence and without proper training. In most cases they won't go to regular sports specific training sessions and their bodies are neither flexible nor strong enough to cope with the physical rigors of the game. Another problem lies with the nature of the sport itself given that many, such as golf for example, are unilateral and develop (or involve) one side of the body or work one set of muscles repeatedly and there will be a resultant imbalance in the body which may lead to an increased risk of injury. Each sport will have specific motor patterns related to the skill required to play it and there is normally little value in tampering with a golfer's swing or a tennis player's serve. However, a few well-designed Pilates exercises added to a normal regular training routine will ensure that the body becomes more balanced and the movement patterns remain normal. The end result will be fewer injuries, faster recuperation from injury trauma and a better performance resulting from sound and efficient muscle recruitment patterns. It is important at this point to state that this is not a 'quick fix' solution but rather a long-term approach to training and body maintenance that uses a mix of exercises recommended for each postural type and specific to each sport to supplement traditional training regimes. In the following months I'll be looking at the most common problems associated with the most popular sports and the Pilates exercises recommended for each one.

## **Northern Ireland Opera in partnership with** **St. Finnian's**

During the Autumn half-term, St. Finnian's hosted a programme of music and theatre skills for primary school children aged 9 to 11 years.

The programme was organised and delivered by NI Opera as part of its Community Outreach Programme. Each day the children were introduced to new skills by professional opera singers, musicians and a choreographer.

They began the week by carving pumpkins to mark Halloween and the autumn Harvest Festival of Samhain before making masks similar to those worn by characters in the recent highly acclaimed NI Opera production: Eugene Onegin.



Each day there was an opportunity to play games and sing as well as getting to know each other and build new friendships. Over 27 children from 7 local primary schools took part in the busy programme which ran daily from 10am to 2pm. Each day started with breakfast and lunch was also provided. On Wednesday morning the children learnt from Adam Ashford how to interpret themes through dance and movement, ranging from gentle stretches and yoga poses to more lively pop dance routines.

On Thursday they enjoyed creating gruesome prosthetics learning how to produce some very convincing bruises and bleeding wounds after watching a demonstration delivered by professional make-up artist Connie McGrath. On the final morning the group was led by opera singer India Chapman-Webb through a number of songs to produce an excellent choral effect. After lunch they visited the church where Junior Churchwarden, Matthew Kidd, a member of the group, ably explained a number of key features of the interior. The children were particularly impressed by the beautiful colours of the stained glass windows and were very interested to see the Harvest decorations of flowers, fruit and vegetables which were still on display.

They returned to the Huston Hall for a final session of drama and storytelling which clearly demonstrated just how much they had learnt during the week and both the “actors” and audience thoroughly enjoyed this activity.

The programme was devised and facilitated by Mrs Bobbi Rai-Purdy, NI Opera Community Outreach Co-ordinator, who lives in the Parish, assisted by Gerard Kelly who leads the youth members at the Lyric Theatre. NI Opera General Manager, Laura Salt attended every day to assist with the programme.

Members of the St. Finnian’s Safeguarding Team attended on different days as volunteers to support the group members as they engaged in their activities. We are very grateful to Jim, Catherine, Charmaine, Heather, Andy and Alison for their assistance. Alan and Claire also provided support during the week with Katherine and Emma assisting across a range of duties and activities. Many thanks to you all.



The children came from many social and ethnic backgrounds and several had special needs. All were keen to participate in the activities and to learn new skills.

Our thanks to Cameron Menzies, Chief Executive and Artistic Director of NI Opera and Matthew Bradley, Production and Events Co-Ordinator, who with Bobbi were keen to base their East Belfast programme at St. Finnian's. This was only their second primary school outreach programme. Last year's venue was in North Belfast.

We are delighted to have had such a successful working relationship with them and thank all the professional artists who were involved in the delivery of the programme including Rachael Heater, Ryan Greer and Tristan Russcher.

Finally on behalf of NI Opera and St. Finnian's, we thank the funders who have made this special community outreach programme possible: Foyle Foundation, the Garfield Weston Foundation and the Arts Council.

(Garfield Weston Foundation also generously funded part of St. Finnian's 2023 Accessibility Project to provide wheelchair accessible spaces in church, the new ramp and paths.)


