Dear Friends

As the magazine is being prepared this month we are enjoying a beautiful week of spring weather. The sun has been shining, the clocks have gone forward and the gardeners are out in force, cutting the grass and getting everything into a beautiful array of colour and vitality. As these things are happening, there is also an anxiety in the air as the recent global tariffs imposed by the United States are creating instability in the financial markets and people are worrying about the industries that provide livelihoods for so many across the globe.

At times like this, we hold to a simple belief that God is Sovereign, that He is in control and He cares for His world and His people right across the world. There has been such upheaval with wars and earthquakes in Myanmar and the continuous rumbling of conflict in Ukraine and Gaza. It's hard to know what is best to pray for but I continually pray for Aid Agencies working on the ground to bring relief and supplies to desperate people across the world. I pray for the rising up of a new generation of peacemakers and negotiators

that can bring about ceasefires and broker peace deals that will bring relief and justice to those who have suffered so terribly in these conflicts.

The church proclaims our belief in a suffering Saviour who walks alongside us in all we face and go through and it was good to be able to reflect so powerfully on His life and death and resurrection in our Lent, Holy Week and Easter services. It was good to get out into the community to invite our neighbourhood to some of these events and to try to share the hope we have found in Jesus. During this month we look forward to welcoming Francis Khamanra, a theological student among us for a 3-week placement. Francis lives in the parish and will be doing some preaching, teaching and visiting during his time with us. We know he will be made welcome in people's homes and as he visits organisations and parish activities over this month. It's also an important month as we look to future staffing for the parish. The Rector will be in Dublin to conduct interviews for Curates who might be interested in coming to serve with us.

Some students have been to visit the parish at different services in recent weeks and we ask you to hold the students and parishes involved in this process in your prayers. It's a significant time for all of these students and their families as they face the prospect of uprooting and moving to other places to serve in ministry. The first Sunday in May is the Belfast Marathon so please be aware there will be some disruption to travelling around the area on that Sunday. The Cregagh Road and Montgomery Road will be among the roads affected so please be mindful of that disruption and allow some extra time to get here. We look forward to a visit from the Leprosy Mission on Sunday

We look forward to a visit from the Leprosy Mission on Sunday 11th May and we want to flag up a special date for the diary during the summer.

We are very hopeful that the choir from Wadham College, Oxford will be performing a summer evening concert on either 2nd or 4th July at 7.30pm. Eva Hayward is part of this choir and we would be very privileged indeed to have such a musical treat playing in the church on a summer's evening.

There is no charge but donations are welcome as the choir undertake this special tour of Northern Ireland. Keep your eye on the website for details. You will also find details of some special events as part of our Mind Matters project this month including a special Taizé service on Wednesday 7th May and a quiet morning under the leadership of Reverend Dr Pat Mollan from the Church's Ministry of Healing on 17th May. Our prayer meetings on Thursdays will resume in May so, as always, there is plenty to look forward to.

We are grateful to all those who have offered to serve on the Select Vestry and congratulate our new Office Bearers for the coming year.





Trees in the church grounds

As many people will now be aware, the recent storms caused substantial damage to a number of trees around the grounds of the church. Some interim work has been carried out on a number of damaged trees but full removal will require professional expertise. The Vestry considered the approach to some trees which escaped damage in the storms but which constitute a threat to our church buildings. Several trees are in positions where, if they were to come down, severe damage would be caused, certainly rendering the church or halls unusable for many months and requiring considerable expenditure to rectify. Some of these trees may have been weakened in the recent storms without displaying any observable damage. Taking into consideration the risks and hazards, it has been determined to take down a number of trees situated very close to buildings to reduce the potential damage in the event of future storms. The Vestry approached a number of contractors for prices for the removal works and the successful contractor has been appointed. Unfortunately, such is the demand for tree removal services at present, the main removal works have been planned for week commencing 16th June. In the meantime, it will be important that children stay away from any damaged trees or trees/ branches on the ground until we can complete removal.

ST. FINNIAN'S HISTORY

ENA KIRKPATRICK - CHILDHOOD MEMORIES

My father, Mr Tommy Crooks, was Sexton in St. Finnian's from the early 1930s to 1954 when he passed away. My earliest memories are when my brother, sister and I had to help out. There was a large expanse of grass all around the church and Sunday School and there were no electric lawn mowers. Daddy had to cut all the grass with a scythe and he often came across birds' nests when he would let the grass grow until the young left the nest.

I remember being told to listen to the Corncrake as it nested in the long grass and of course today, it is on the endangered list in this part of the world. I often had wild honey squeezed into my mouth while we turned the hay on a summer's day, wild heather grew on the bank leading up to the Rectory so I think the bees liked that. The hay was made into haystacks and was sold to "Nesbit's Riding School" which was situated where Downshire Park South is now.

The war years are particularly memorable as the Sunday School was opened up for the people from Belfast to sleep as Cregagh Park was practically in the country. I remember being wheeled up to church in my pram to sleep. My mother prepared a flask of tea and, I presume, some sandwiches. The general public slept in the Sunday School where army blankets were stacked up in a corner for the folk fleeing East Belfast, which was severely bombed. We slept in the Choir Vestry. In the morning Daddy would gather empty shell cases from the church grounds as the Americans, who were stationed on the Rocky Road, would have been firing at enemy aircraft who were, I presume, trying to target the shipyard in Belfast.

My brother and sister attended Sunday School in a small hall on the other side of the then Hillfoot Road, this was before the Parochial Hall was built. They often got an hour or two out of school as they had to pump the organ for weddings during the week, they received five shillings for this task which is approximately twenty-five pence in today's money. Mr Sharpe, who was organist at that time, was blind. My mother opened the church for such occasions and woe betide any female who attempted to enter not wearing a hat, this was not allowed in those days nor to throw confetti inside the church. I remember joining the Girl Guides. Mrs Johnston was the Captain but she left to go and live in Cookstown and a lady from Rosetta came to be our Captain and remained quite a long time, she was called Mrs Vera Stewart and I was hooked for a long time - I loved the Guides. Through time I became a Patrol Leader and my Patrol was the Fuchsia Patrol.

Through the Guides I made life-long friends.

Captain left our company just at the same time as I did when I became sixteen and I went to help in the Brownies. That became another chapter which lasted for a long time.

I eventually became Brown Owl of a pack of little girls, at least sixty in number. I remember going on a picnic to Lorne. My cousin Jean Buchanan helped in the Brownies too and she and I took them on the Cregagh bus and then on the Bangor train to Lorne. I think all the little girls had their packed lunch eaten before we got off the bus at the Albert Bridge to walk to the BCDR station to catch the train. We had a great time and everyone got home safely!

Eventually we had to split the pack and create two packs. Another great friend I had helping in our pack was the late Maureen Davidson (Rodgers), she and I were together taking Brownies for many years. We enjoyed the little displays or parents' evenings that we practiced for together and I think the girls enjoyed them too, they were fun.

I got married in 1965 and continued with the pack as I could travel to the church quite easily. When I came to live where I live now however, it was not so convenient so I had to retire after seventeen years from being Brown Owl and from St. Finnian's church.

My brother was in the Boys' Brigade for many years and he had to keep his uniform spick and span. The belt polished and the buckle cleaned with Brasso, the button on the pillbox hat whitened, the displays were always memorable. Mr Johnston and then Mr Gardiner and the Crawford family were always involved the Company. Mr Harry Crawford and Mr Wilson Crawford were there when my brother was a boy. Many happy memories for me of my time in St. Finnian's church.

St. Finnian's Pilates



The 80\20 Rule in Pilates

This month I thought it would be interesting to explore a subject that doesn't immediately seem related to exercise and fitness. The 80/20 rule is also known as the Pareto principle after the Italian economist Vilfredo Pareto, who observed that 20% of the population owned 80% of Italy's wealth. It has since been applied in various fields including business and fitness and, in the case of fitness, the Pareto principle suggests that 80% of your results come from 20% of your efforts. However, rather than advocating for less or minimal effort in exercising, it emphasises the importance of focussing on those activities and exercise types that deliver the most significant or beneficial outcomes. A very good example of this would be to focus on compound movement such as squats, that require a number of body muscle groups as this will have a better overall fitness impact compared to an exercise that focuses on a singe muscle group, such as a supported arm curl. In the context of Pilates, the key to applying the 80/20 principle is to maintain a focus on core movements such as the Hundred, one of Joseph Pilates favourite exercises, and roll ups or leg circles. Although these core movements may comprise only 20% of available exercises in a session, they can provide 80% of the benefits when carried out correctly and consistently given that they require you to engage the entire body, especially the core, while controlling pelvic alignment. There is also a focus on performing the exercises with greater precision using slower controlled movements, i.e. quality rather than quantity and speed. Having said that, there is a place for other exercises and movements within a Pilates class that may focus on particular joints or muscle groups as these will help prepare the body to carry out the core movements correctly and safely for maximum benefit. The key, as always, will be to 'listen' to your body and only complete the number of repetitions for any exercise that you feel you can do correctly and safely.
