Dear Friends

As this month's magazine goes to print, we are delighted to announce the appointment of Reverend Dr. Ryan Hawk as Curate Assistant here in St. Finnian's. Ryan will take up his appointment in mid-June following his ordination to the Priesthood on Sunday 15th June at 3.30pm in Down Cathedral. We hope as many as possible will come and support Ryan on this special occasion and we look forward to welcoming him and his wife Sarah and his two sons Liam and Jude as they come to serve alongside us. Ryan has served as a Deacon Intern in Holy Trinity Church, Ballylesson over the past 3 years. It has also been a joy to welcome Francis Khamanra, a theological student on placement with us over 3 weeks in May. Over that period, Francis visited many of our organisations and he took part in leading services and preaching. He carried out some visiting in hospitals and nursing homes and in people's homes. He brought a deep sense of joy and living faith to all that he did and it's always a privilege to be involved for a little while in the formation of students for ministry.

Over many years, St. Finnian's has been involved in training students and clergy and offering a broad range of experiences to those who come among us to learn. People have been so encouraging and supportive and this makes a huge difference as people are taking their first steps in ministry. None of us are the finished article and I have always appreciated the way people bear with you when you make mistakes and get things wrong and help you to grow in confidence and competence as you get used to many new things. So many theological students and newly ordained Curates are a bit older these days and bring a wealth of experience from their previous jobs that really help in all sorts of ways as they begin the ordained ministry. Our thoughts and prayers will be with Francis as he returns to his training in Dublin and with Ryan as he begins his ministry here in mid-June.

Another group of people who are very much in our thoughts and prayers at this time of year are the young people sitting important exams in schools and universities.

There's a certain inevitability about the sun making its appearance and the weather turning warm and pleasant as people try to study and concentrate on all the materials they have learned for their exams. Some younger students will have discovered in recent weeks where they will be heading to secondary school and that's another big transition as people move from primary to secondary schools. When people get a place in the school they have chosen as a first preference and having worked hard to secure that spot there's a lot of joy as those letters flutter through the letterbox. There will however be others who will feel disappointed and sad at not achieving the marks they had hoped for or the school of their choice. Let's hold all our young people in prayer asking that God will reveal to each one just how precious they are in His sight and His good plans for their lives. We have enjoyed some very special events in recent weeks in church. It was wonderful to welcome the choir from St. Malachy's College to sing choral evensong in May under the direction of Mark our musical director. We enjoyed a



Hello everyone

Just to confirm the outing to the Livingston Centre at Killinchy Parish which was supposed to take place on Saturday 7th June has been postponed due to booking issues and we intend to go in September instead. Details to follow in due course.

Here we are again approaching the summertime and our MU Branch meetings pause until September this year. You've heard of the old saying "Don't judge (criticize) or criticise anyone until you've walked a mile in their shoes or Moccasins!" - Moccasins relates to the Cherokee Indians where the proverb comes from. Although the meaning is don't be in a rush to judge someone too quickly, I think it could aid us in using our imagination in a positive way to simply help us understand and respond to people in very different circumstances than our own. Mothers' Union as a global organisation helps us do that with the Connect magazine which is published in the Spring and the Autumn. Other Christian movements such as Christian Aid, Tear Fund, Barnabas Trust etc also keep us up-to-date about what is happening in God's world. Can I, can you, try to think what it would be like to flee your home with your family, lose your livelihood, travel far with only the clothes on your back and little else, live in a refugee camp? This is the experience of thousands in Sudan. Mothers' Union are helping with feeding the hungry, enabling access to basic health care, running literacy classes and praying for them, offering fellowship and support and relocation to safer places in Egypt and South Sudan. Another positive initiative led by MU helps young families by delivering an 8-12-week Parenting Programme taught through locally trained people in places like the Solomon Islands. This has seen a big impact on nurturing healthy relationships benefiting husbands, wives and children.

So whether tragedies are caused by war, famine, disease or natural disasters, MU are there to respond as "your (Jesus') hands across the world" (from the MU prayer).

Just to return to the Cherokee proverb mentioned above when we think about the Incarnation, isn't that what Jesus did? He came from above, left all the majesty of heaven and stepped into our world in a human body born at Bethlehem to take on our nature, experience all the joys and sorrows of life and ultimately to die for our sins and rise again. He truly knows how we feel and can sympathise with our struggles and weaknesses and help us overcome them by His Spirit. I omitted from previous notes to congratulate Heather Leckey on her appointment as Diocesan Secretary for the Down and Dromore Diocese. All of us from our Parish wish her all the best in this important role.

May you all have a lovely summer with family and friends. Hopefully, weather permitting, we will be able to enjoy activities outdoors.

Tree history

Most members of the congregation will remember the large tree which was formerly in the front grounds between the Garden of Remembrance and the road. This was badly damaged in the first of the recent storms and has been largely removed, leaving a stump which will be extracted during the course of June. Examination of the tree rings in the stump has revealed two items of interest. Firstly, it can be observed that in a number of years the growth rings are remarkably thick indicating extremely good growth rates. This reflects a comment made to me some years ago by a forester friend who said that Ireland is the best place on the planet to grow trees having a remarkably moderate climate, with plenty of moisture. The second bit of information which has been revealed is that the tree was approximately 36 years old. If we presume that the tree was planted at something like 4 to 6 years old, then it would have been planted around 30 to 32 years ago, that is around 1993 - 1995.

Does anyone recall this tree being planted? Was there a specific reason for it being planted? There is a polished stone at the base of the tree, but with no inscription, perhaps something had been attached to the stone which has since been lost. If you have any information on the background to this tree perhaps you would get in touch with myself, Geoff Harman or Linda Campbell.

It is hoped to have the remaining tree removal work carried out around the middle of June.

Finally, just to state the obvious, we all know how curious children can be, but it will be most important that they stay away from any damaged trees or trees/branches on the ground until we can complete removal.


Keeping Up Appearances

ST. FINNIAN'S HISTORY

JOHN DOWNEY - FIELDS OF LIFE



Fields of Life has built two small hospitals and two clinics in Uganda. St. Finnian's equipped these facilities with most of their basic equipment. Over a few years, four 40 ft containers were filled with secondhand hospital equipment, acquired from the various Hospital Trusts in Northern Ireland. This, along with school materials and building equipment, was shipped to Uganda. The logistical nightmare of getting the goods to their destinations began at Kampala's Customs. Despite meticulous manifests, they removed all the goods from the tightly packed containers to check them. We had to employ the services of an armed guard to prevent theft. Transporting the goods to the various locations was always a challenge - near impassable roads in trucks with bare tyres, damaged tarpaulins and cracked windscreens.

For several years we assisted with the running of one of these hospitals, The Rapha Medical Centre, located beside the equator in southwest Uganda. In the initial stages the local witch doctors and village 'birthing woman' tried to dissuade people from attending the hospital, stating they would be mistreated and even killed. However with outreach to the villages and successful treatment of patients, this was gradually overcome.

There are many moving stories from the hospital, such as the little baby girl who was abandoned at the hospital entrance, seriously ill with pneumonia and expected to die. The hospital team worked passionately with her for weeks and managed to save her young life. She had no name or family and she was always bright and smiling, so the staff called her Haffi. Happily a lady who had been a patient in the hospital adopted her. On another occasion a young girl was minding a cow that had just given birth to a calf. This was alongside the roadway where there was some grass available. When she tried to bring the cow home, the animal was in a protective mood and gored the girl across the stomach spilling out her intestines with its metre long horns. She was found lying at the side of the road by some people who put her on their truck, then dumped her at the entrance of the hospital and drove away. Locals do this in case they would be asked to pay for treatment. Our doctor put back her intestines as best he could and put a large bandage around her body. However she needed serious surgery which was beyond the scope of our little hospital. We managed to hire a pickup truck locally. We laid her in the back on a pressure release mattress and drove through the night on very rough unpaved roads to a hospital who had a surgeon. During the night she underwent an operation and fortunately her organs were not too seriously damaged. She was kept there for a week and returned to Rapha to convalescence where she regained good health. There are many such stories from the hospital, some good, some sad, but many lives have been saved in the 'not for profit' hospital where no one is turned away regardless of their ability to pay.

In later years, Fields of Life decided to withdraw from funding medical facilities. However, St. Finnian's still maintains a connection with Rapha Medical Centre.

St. Finnian's Pilates



For this month's article I thought it would be useful to consider a question I've been asked occasionally i.e. is Reformer or Mat Pilates better? Before I do that it's worth noting that Pilates is growing in popularity and, according to the 'ClassPass2024 Look Back Report' it was the most booked fitness class last year. The two main types of Pilates workout methods currently are Mat Pilates and Reformer Pilates. As the name suggests, Mat Pilates is done on a mat and uses body weight for resistance to develop greater core strength and stability. On the other hand, Reformer Pilates is done on a machine, called a 'reformer', which is basically a raised mat that moves with springs for resistance and 'fixes' the hands and feet with straps and loops. While both can build strength, improve flexibility and posture, the choice of which type will come down to personal preference, goals and, it has to be said, cost. Mat Pilates is low impact and is gentle on your joints and is a better option for those who experience joint pain, have mobility issues or are recovering from an injury. It has the additional benefit of not requiring expensive or bulky equipment and can be done anywhere. However, it can be tough if starting from square one or if you've never done any form of core strength training before, and it is vital to use proper form to avoid putting undue strain on joints and muscles. This is why most Pilates exercises have many modifications and options based on classical movements. The main benefit of Reformer Pilates is that the body can be trained lying down with springs to provide resistance as opposed to gravity and it can be more easily adapted for rehabilitation of injuries. However, it is expensive (each item of equipment can cost several thousand pounds), it may be intimidating because of the equipment, and ideally should be done in very small groups to ensure the exercises are carried out safely. For most people, Mat Pilates will be the obvious choice to start with and it is a great way to learn the fundamental movements and principles, which in turn may allow you to give Reformer Pilates a go. No matter which you choose, the most important thing is to work to your own limits and focus on performing the basic movements with precision and correct form to get the most benefit from the exercises.
