
Sunday School, Creche & Youth Group

Summer is behind us and autumn is in the air, there is the sense of getting back to school, university and all our church activities will soon be in full swing. I was thinking about the unrest in the UK, including in our own province, over migration issues in the last few months. People have concerns for the safety of their young people and communities generally so I wondered what the right way of things were on the ground? Surely violence and racism aren't the answer. Coming home from the beautiful north coast recently on the A26 I saw on a church noticeboard a sign which read "I was a stranger and you invited me in" (Matthew 25:35) As you know, we are due to visit the Livingston Centre in Killinchy on Saturday 20th September. The Livingston family, descendants of the Rev. John Livingston who served as minister in Killinchy from 1630-1636, made their way to the New World of North America and made a considerable impact there. A few years ago, I went for the first time to the Ulster American Folk Park near Omagh. I remember stepping onto the replica ship and being told of the harsh unsafe conditions on board. The idea was that you exited the vessel on the other side and were shown around what was supposed to be the land of North America and the type of dwellings there. So it has never been easy being a migrant in any era. As well as the verse above spoken by Jesus, there are many verses in scripture along the same lines. "And you are to love those who are foreigners; for you yourselves were foreigners in Egypt." Deuteronomy 10:19 Hopefully our trip to the centre will give us food for thought about the many hardships endured by generations seeking a better life through hard work and perseverance and continues to the present day. Changes to Parish Expenses Policy

In June, as part of the overall review of Diocesan policies, the Select Vestry revised the Expenses Policy for St. Finnian's. Expenses should now be claimed using the Parish Expense Claim Form - available from the Treasurer & Linda Campbell in the church office and submitted along with receipts to the Treasurer before reimbursement takes place. All expense claims will now be repaid by electronic transfer directly into a bank account and cheques for expenses will no longer be issued. Prior approval in principle is required for expense claims above £250.

The above relates to expense claims made direct to the Parish Treasurer. Individual Parish organisations who manage their own funds will have their own policies for reimbursement.

ST. FINNIAN'S HISTORY

RALPH MCMURRAY & STEPHEN LECKEY MEN'S SOCIETY

In October 1982, on the 50th anniversary of the establishment of St. Finnian's, it was decided to form a branch of the Men's Society, an organisation designed to promote fellowship and support among the men of the parish. An inaugural team of Bill Christie, Chairman, Bill Ruddock, Secretary and Derek Catney, Treasurer led the way in what was to become a new venture for the parish. Forty-five men joined in that first year, rising to some fifty-five in subsequent times.

Meetings were held monthly, initially from September to May, with speakers invited to talk on a range of topics. No subject was out of bounds and speakers consisted of sportspeople, men and women of the cloth. Secretaries of State and other local politicians, Chief Constables, writers and other prominent figures in the community. St Finnian's Men's Society quickly gained a reputation for attracting speakers of the highest quality in their chosen fields. On some occasions, the Mothers' Union and other Men's Societies were invited to attend. The then First Minister, Arlene Foster paid a visit, the historian Eamon Phoenix was a particular favourite, Lord Robin Eames spoke on more than one occasion as did Dame Mary Peters and the well-known writer, Paul Clements. On the occasion of the talk by the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Ireland, the Most Revd. Eamon Martin, the neighbouring parishioners of St. Bernadette's were invited to attend, resulting in a hall bursting at the seams! For many years, Men's Society member Dr Roddy Evans drafted reports of each meeting for the parish magazine, a role that was subsequently embraced by Garth Corbett in more recent times. In addition to the monthly meetings, an Annual General Meeting including a meal was held in May at a different venue each year, notably on one occasion on HMS Caroline.

An annual outing was arranged in conjunction with other branches of the Men's Society, one year consisting of a visit to the then President of Ireland, Mary Robinson, at her official residence in Phoenix Park. In addition, a yearly service was held for members and their guests, hosted in turn by one of the Men's Society branches.

For this history project we are inviting you to submit any memories you have of the Men's Society to include in later articles. Perhaps there was a speaker whom you found particularly stimulating, an outing which held vivid memories or anything else that sticks in your mind or created an impression.

St. Finnian's Pilates



Core strength vs six pack

Summer is over and Pilates is back up and running at St. Finnian's and I thought it might be interesting to share something I came across in a recent podcast which discussed the subject of Core Strength and asked the guestion 'is it more than having a six pack?'. I'm sure we've all seen the Hollywood action heroes with their sculpted abdominals and wondered if that is the ideal we should all aim for and if a six pack is actually the best representation of core fitness. Thankfully the answer is a resounding no! In reality there are a number of factors that will determine whether you can even develop the abdominals to that degree anyway, including lifestyle, genetics, sleep and nutrition and it very much depends whether you are focussing on aesthetics rather than fitness and functionality. In the case of our Hollywood hero. the look is 'fit for purpose' for screen time but may not enable them to carry out other activities requiring the core muscles to work at optimal function and avoid damage/injury. At this point it's worth revisiting what we mean by the 'core' - it is a cylinder of internal and external muscles between the ribs and pelvis that work in a coordinated manner to optimise movement and protect the spine. This is different to the focus on a single muscle in order to obtain the 'look', although depending on the exercise regime undertaken, there could be some benefit to the other core muscles. However, the aim of Pilates is to specifically target all the muscles in the core, starting from a comfortable level and progressively increasing the workload to build capacity (strength and functionality) within those muscles and to allow them to work in a balanced coordinated way. Together with general activity and other types of exercise such as swimming and gym-based classes, this will contribute to a better 'healthspan' (the number of years enjoying good health) rather than just an increased lifespan. As ever, I hope this has provided some food for thought about how and why you exercise and, until next time, stay safe and keep moving. We meet on Wednesdays at 7pm in the Huston Hall. Everyone is welcome and a small donation of £3 per class is requested for church funds.
